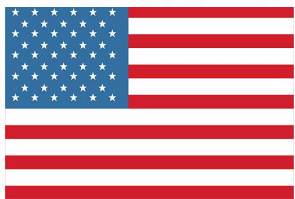

Culture & Activities in Frauenfeld and Surrounding Region

Frauenfeld is the canton capital of Thurgau



Frauenfeld the Thurgau capital with 25'990 inhabitants is located in the west of the canton and its charming surroundings with the wide Thur valley and the rolling hills of the region invite you to go hiking and cycling. In addition to the time-honored castle, the well-kept old town, the diverse Eisenwerk cultural center and the steel Stählibuck tower, the underground roundabout at the train station is a landmark of the city.



History



Frauenfeld emerged as a fortified small town settlement in the 13th century on the territory of (long and short-) Erchingen. In the 9th century, "Erichinga" was a royal court and place of justice with its own church and at this time it became the property of the Reichenau monastery as a royal donation.

The Frauenfeld Castle



The start of construction on the tower of Frauenfeld Castle can be dated to around 1230 based on the wooden beams that are still preserved today. Immediately next to this stately center, the settlement was built in the second third of the 13th century, the name of which was first mentioned in a document in 1246. Frauenfeld is documented as a town as early as 1286. At this time, the bailiwick of the Reichenau property rested with the Habsburgs, who may have inherited this function from the Kyburgs in 1264.

After the Confederates conquered Thurgau in 1460, they gradually made Frauenfeld the administrative center of the landgraviate. As early as 1500, Frauenfeld became the first meeting location of the federal parliament. The federal governor resided in Frauenfeld Castle from 1532. Frauenfeld Castle is not only a landmark of the Thurgau capital, it is also home to the Thurgau Historical Museum.

Frauenfeld Openair Festival



The Openair Frauenfeld is the largest open-air music festival in German-speaking Switzerland and the largest hip-hop festival in Europe. The event has been taking place since 1987. It used to be a rock and blues festival called Out in the Green Festival, which also once took place in Winterthur. The open air has been running under the name Openair Frauenfeld since 2006 and presents mostly hip-hop artists.

Last Frauenfeld Openair was on July 11 - 13, 2024

Culture in Frauenfeld



Frauenfeld's cultural life impresses with its wide variety of offerings in a small space. Most cultural events are located within one square kilometer. In addition to the cantonal institutions (libraries and museums), it is primarily associations and private individuals that offer the public events on a small scale through to events with a national impact. The manageable size of the city and the commitment of many residents lead to good networking; Artists and art educators meet every six months with the city's cultural leaders at a round table, the so-called KulTisch, to discuss things and come up with new ideas.

Mammoth Raft Race



Every Mother's Day in May an extraordinary spectacle takes place on Sitter and Thur: the traditional Mammoth Raft Race. Raft riders compete over a distance of around 12 kilometers from Degenau to Kradolf. It's not just about speed. No, the real eye-catchers are the raft structures and the crew's costumes, which are made specifically for this race in countless hours of work with great attention to detail. This crazy raft trip is bizarre, adventurous and not entirely harmless.

The 50th Mammoth Raft Race Sitter-Thur took place in May 2024.

CatWalk9220



The CatWalk9220 is a modern, approximately two-hour scavenger hunt and brings exercise and fun for the whole family. Equipped with item instructions, puzzle fans discover 20 natural places around Bischofszell and try to find the treasure. The participants start at the town hall. The post instructions, which can be obtained here, are absolutely necessary to find your way to the goal. The entire trail around Bischofszell includes 20 posts. The cat must not be lost sight of on the way and the aim is to find the way to the goal and the treasure using the solutions to various puzzles.

Tip: Pack bratwurst and bread and stop at the Swiss Family Feuerstelle on the way. Or enjoy a refreshing swim in the Thur or in the swimming pool.

Kraftort Kartausen Ittingen / Ittingen Charterhouse is a place of power



Just outside Frauenfeld, in Warth-Weiningen, lies one of the largest pearls in Thurgau: the Ittingen Charterhouse. The former Carthusian monastery is now a cultural center. Its story is told in the Ittinger Museum and on various guided tours or audio guide tours. The historic rooms also house the Thurgau Art Museum, hotel, monastery shop and concert series. Here you can dine in the monastic sense of self-sufficiency: with the zero-kilometer menu, no ingredient has traveled more than a kilometer to reach the plate. Historic rose and herb gardens, vineyards, a fish farm and the estate are part of the Charterhouse and can be discovered.

Musician Walty Anselmo dies at the age of 77 on March 22th, 2024

Walty Anselmo was considered the "Swiss Jimi Hendrix" and was one of the first rock musicians in Switzerland in the 1960s: **Krokodil band member Walty Anselmo the guitarist and singer** died on Friday night, as his band colleague Düde Dürst told the Keystone-SDA news agency upon request.

Anselmo founded the progressive rock band **Krokodil** in 1969 together with music pioneers **Hardy Hepp** and **Düde Dürst**. They were mainly influenced by the influential electric guitar virtuoso Jimi Hendrix and became known beyond the country's borders.

Anselmo played music in many different styles. Among other things, he played bass in the popular song "**Grüezi wohl, Frau Stirnimaa**" by the Minstrels. The song stayed at the top of the Swiss charts for ten weeks in 1969.



Legendary headliner



Anselmo, born in 1946, grew up in Rüslikon ZH. At the age of 14 he bought his first guitar. During his apprenticeship as a retoucher he founded his first band and played regularly in Zurich nightclubs.

Anselmo was the only Swiss musician to play as the opening act at the legendary Rolling Stones concert in Zurich's Hallenstadion in 1967 and as the headliner at the two-day monster concert in 1968 with Jimi Hendrix, among others. Anselmo had the honor of picking up his idol at Zurich Airport.

In 1974, Anselmo gave up his professional career as a musician. From then on, he worked as a printer. Krokodil released around ten albums, most recently in 2020 and 2021. For health reasons, Anselmo was only there as a "special guest".

With a great amount of sadness and heavy hearts, we have to let you know that our friend,

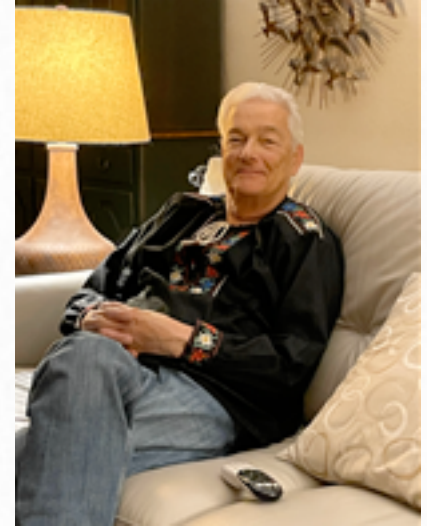
Eddy (Edmond) Schaefer

Swiss and Austrian Club Members Hike Gateway Trailhead Loop in Scottsdale McDowell Sonoran Preserve

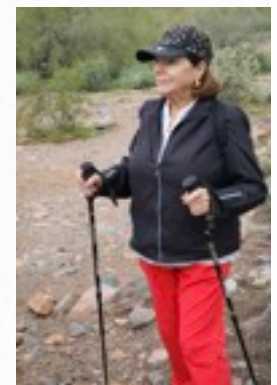

Thurgauer Käseschnitten / Thurgauer cheese slices

Sometimes good things are so simple. Like Thurgau cheese slices! The farmer's bread, drizzled with apple juice, is topped with Tilsiter, apples, bacon and onions and then baked.

Ingredients:

- 2 apples
- 8 slices of Thurgau Tilsiter cheese
- 2 spring onions
- 50 ml sweet cider or apple juice
- 8 slices of bread
- Pepper



Instructions:

Preheat the oven to 220° degrees top and bottom heat. Cover the baking tray with baking paper. Place the bread slices on the tray and brush the slices with apple juice. Finely chop the spring onion. Wash, halve and core the apples. Then cut into 3mm thin slices. Cover the bread slices with the apple slices and place the onion on top and then cut the cheese into 5mm thick slices and place on top. Bake the cheese slices in the middle of the oven for 10 to 15 minutes.

Tip

Place a slice of bacon on top and bake. Slices also taste very good with pears. Serve the slices with a fine green salad.
